"VINA'S HISTORY In photos and stories"



With all of the recent news coverage of the Civil War Rebel flag and the passionate appeals on both sides of the question of the flag's display, we at the TCM have discussed our responsibilities in this matter. After all, we do have on wall display a Rebel flag as part of our Civil War exhibit and it does generate questions and discussion from our visitors. Here are a few of our conclusions:

- 1.) Discussion and questions are healthy and can lead to greater understanding.
- 2.) As a Museum, we cannot take sides on any controversial issues, so neither can we omit elements of either side of such issues just because they are controversial.
- The Rebel flag is perhaps the most recognizable symbol of the Confederate's side of the Civil War and it is a part of our nation's history.
- 4.) How we display the Rebel Flag is crucial. In our view, running it up the flagpole would constitute an endorsement of what it stood for, and we will not do that. We have it as a part of a larger Civil War dis play in the Annex. It is on the wall above our "Tehama County and the Civil War" display along with the U.S. flag - Rebel on the left, Union on the right. Primarily, we read left to right in this country. The two flags as we display them are a visual thumbnail account of the Civil War - the South rebelled, the Union prevailed. Hav-i ng shown that, the visitor is invited to learn about Tehama County's Civil War history through the display.
- 5.) We sure do hope you come and enjoy the show and let's keep talking.
